SUBJECT: 2016 Update for Georgia Project on NC 69, A-0011, Clay County, ER 05-2490

Thank you for your October 26, 2016, email and letter to update us on the status of the three properties that were determined eligible for listing under Section 106 in 2005. We have reviewed the information provided and concur that both the Cherry Farm (CY0027) and McClure Farm (CY0028), while they experience some loss of structures, remain eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places for the reasons outlined in your letter. We acknowledge that the Orville Lee Hall Farm (CY0026) is no longer extant or eligible for the National Register.

We very much appreciate your effort in updating this information and look forward to consulting with you on the effects of the proposed upgrade to NC 69 when plans are available.

The above comments are made pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's Regulations for Compliance with Section 106 codified at 36 CFR Part 800.



Dear Renee,

In October 2005, a Historic Architectural Resources Survey Report was completed as part of the GDOT project to widen NC 69 (GDOT Project APD-056-2(24)). As a result, the McClure Farm (CY0028), Orville Lee Hall Farm (CY0026), and the Cherry Farm (CY0027) were determined eligible for National Register listing. The North Carolina portion of the project has been recently resubmitted for review under NCDOT project A-0011, and as the survey is over ten years old, we assessed any changes to the determined eligible properties and other properties over fifty years of age falling within the Area of Potential Effects. Based on this review, NCDOT has found that there are no newly eligible properties in the APE and that the Orville Lee Hall Farm is no longer extant, which has already been noted within GIS mapping. The Cherry Farm remains relatively unchanged (one shed is no longer standing) but still retains its eligibility.

The McClure Farm was determined eligible as a well-preserved example of a twentieth century agricultural complex but has lost the original c. 1920 main house and two sheds since the 2005 survey. The frame, one-story house was noted as in poor condition when surveyed in June 2004. Despite these losses, we feel that the property still conveys its significance as an agricultural complex. All other agricultural outbuildings remain, particularly the dairy barns and large cow barn noted in the survey. A brick ranch house associated with the farm, built 1967 and also within the proposed National Register boundary, has reached 50 years of age and continues to convey the occupation and agricultural use of the property in the twentieth century. We feel that the McClure Farm retains integrity and continues to be eligible for National Register listing.











CLAY COUNTY TIP NO. A-00IIC




Cherry Farm Site Plan, 2004.



Area of Potential Effects outlined in red at location of Cherry Farm.


Extends 75' from the centerline each way and 125' at the intersection of each road.




Cherry Farm, looking west. 2016




Area of Potential Effects outlined in red at location of McClure Farm. Extends 75' from the centerline each way and 125' at the intersection of each road.




McClure Farm Site Plan, 2004.




Aerial View of McClure Farm. SHPO GIS.




McClure Farm c. 1920 Main House from survey report.




McClure Farm c. 1920 Main House location. 2016
