Thank you for your letter of August 30, 2005, transmitting the survey report by Heather Fearnbach of Edwards-Pitman Environmental, Inc. for the above project.

For purposes of compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, we concur that the following property is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under the criterion cited:

- ◆ Yokeley Farm, 5958 Gumtree Road, Forsyth County, is eligible for the National Register under Criterion A for agriculture, as a rare intact example of a medium-sized farmstead in the Abbotts Creek area. The farm is associated with agrarian life in Forsyth and Davidson counties from the mid-nineteenth through the mid-twentieth centuries. The farm, including the house and outbuildings, is also eligible under Criterion C for architecture, as a representative example of agricultural building evolution from subsistence farming to commercial enterprise.

The 34.5-acre farm complex consists of the two-story frame I-house and eleven contributing outbuildings. We concur with the proposed National Register boundary as described, justified, and delineated in the report.

For purposes of compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, we concur that the following property is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places:

- ◆ Hine Farm, 3188 Gumtree Road, Davidson County, because it is a common type and is neither significant nor architecturally distinctive.



**MANAGEMENT SUMMARY**

The North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) proposes to improve NC 109 from SR 1798 (Old Greensboro Road) in Davidson County to I-40/US 311 in Forsyth County. Five alternatives are being considered for the project, which aims to ease congestion and improve safety on the existing facility in response to above average accident rates. The alternatives include widening the existing NC 109 corridor from a two-lane facility to a four-lane-divided facility and the creation of four-lane-divided alignments for NC 109 on new locations east and west of the existing road.

NCDOT Historic Architecture Section staff conducted a Phase II intensive-level historic resources survey of the project area in February of 1995. Two of the fifty-seven properties surveyed, the D. Austin Parker and Mark Parker Houses on Teague Road, were determined eligible for the National Register. The North Carolina State Historic Preservation Office (HPO) requested additional information on the John William Hiatt Farm, located on the west side of NC 109 approximately one-half mile south of Old Greensboro Road, and the property was deemed National Register-eligible in 1996. All three properties are located outside the five current alternatives for the proposed improvements to NC 109.

Due to the amount of time that had lapsed between the original survey and the creation of new project alternatives, the HPO requested an update of the 1995 architectural survey report. Edwards-Pitman Environmental, Inc. (EPE) conducted a Phase II intensive-level historic resources survey within a study area delineated by NCDOT and identified and evaluated all structures over fifty years of age within the Area of Potential Effects (APE) according to the National Register of Historic Places Criteria for Evaluation. EPE historians conducted the field survey by automobile and on foot on June 7, 13 and 16, 2005, covering one hundred percent of the APE. Investigators photographed, mapped and

evaluated every property over fifty years of age. Two properties considered worthy of further analysis were evaluated in July 2005.

In addition to the field survey, EPE reviewed the survey, Study List and National Register files at the HPO in Raleigh. The principal investigator conducted research at Old Salem, Inc., the Forsyth County Courthouse, the Davidson County Courthouse, the Z. Smith Reynolds Library at Wake Forest University and the Forsyth County Public Library in Winston-Salem. EPE also contacted local archaeologists, historians and property owners for additional information.

EPE staff historians delineated the APE on USGS topographical quadrangle maps (Appendix A). The APE includes areas that may be physically and/or visually affected by the proposed project.

The project area includes one hundred and forty-nine (149) properties over fifty years of age, one hundred and forty-seven (147) of which were determined not eligible for the National Register at a concurrence meeting on June 28, 2005. At that meeting it was decided that two properties, the Yokeley Farm and the Hine Farm, were to be evaluated in more detail. Two properties in the project area had previously been determined not eligible for the National Register as a result of the 1995 survey.

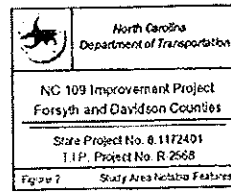

### III. Physical Environment

The study area for the proposed improvements to NC 109 includes five approximately eight-mile-long, 100-foot-wide corridors along NC 109 from SR 1798 (Old Greensboro Road) in Davidson County to I-40/US 311 in Forsyth County. All of the alternatives begin just north of Old Greensboro road. One alternative involves widening the existing NC 109 corridor and follows the existing facility except for a western bypass of Wallburg on a new location. One alternative extends north and west from North Clodfelter Road and intersects US 52 rather than I-40. Three additional alternatives are primarily on new locations east and west of the existing NC 109 corridor.

The study area is characterized by mid-to late-twentieth-century residential and commercial development. Most residences in the project area are modest in size and stylistic influence and date from the post-World War II period. A few late-nineteenth and early-twentieth-century houses survive along with domestic and agricultural outbuildings and fields associated with tobacco and dairy farms. Recent residential development has further impacted the rural character of the study area in the form of new subdivisions that occupy many historically agricultural parcels. Some residences on NC 109 have been adapted for use as businesses, and strip malls, gas stations and fast food restaurants occupy large lots, particularly at the Shoppes at Wallburg Landing at the Forsyth/Davidson County line. Shady Grove United Methodist Church is prominently located at the southwest corner of Shady Grove Church Road and NC 109.



#### IV. Methodology

EPE conducted a Phase II intensive-level historic resources survey with the following goals: (1) to determine the APE, defined as the geographic area or areas within which a project may cause changes in the character or use of historic properties, if any such properties exist; (2) to identify all significant resources within the APE; and (3) to evaluate these resources according to the National Register of Historic Places criteria. EPE historians conducted the field survey by automobile and on foot on June 7, 13 and 16, 2005, covering one hundred percent of the APE. Investigators photographed, mapped and evaluated every property over fifty years of age. Two properties considered worthy of further analysis were evaluated in July 2005.

In addition to the field survey, EPE reviewed the survey, Study List and National Register files at the North Carolina State Historic Preservation Office (HPO) in Raleigh. The principal investigator conducted research at Old Salem, Inc., the Forsyth County Courthouse, the Davidson County Courthouse, the Z. Smith Reynolds Library at Wake Forest University and the Forsyth County Public Library in Winston-Salem. EPE also contacted local archaeologists, historians and property owners for additional information.

EPE staff historians delineated the APE on USGS topographical quadrangle maps (Appendix A). The APE includes areas that may be physically and/or visually affected by the proposed project.

EPE conducted the survey and prepared this report in accordance with the provisions of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Technical Advisory T 6640.8A (Guidance for Preparing and Processing Environmental and Section 4(f) Documents); the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological and Historic Preservation (48 FR 44716); 36 CFR Part 60; 36 CFR Part 800; and the NCDOT document entitled *Historic Architectural Resources: Survey Procedures and Report Guidelines* (2003). This survey and report meet the guidelines of NCDOT and the National Park Service.

## V. Background Information and Historic Context

Forsyth County was formed in 1849 from part of Stokes County and named for Colonel Benjamin Forsyth (ca.1760-1814), a Stokes County resident, state legislator and casualty of the War of 1812. Roughly one-third of what became Forsyth County consisted of the Wachovia tract—98,985 acres of Piedmont North Carolina purchased by German-speaking Moravian settlers from Lord Granville in 1753. Salem, laid out in 1766, was the largest town in Wachovia. Smaller outlying Moravian towns included Bethabara (1753) and Bethania (1759) to the north of Salem, and the communities of Friedberg (1771), Friedland (1771) and Hope (1780) to the south.<sup>1</sup>

The region was sparsely settled through the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. In 1849, the Moravians sold fifty-one acres north of Salem to the newly formed Forsyth County government for the county seat. It was not until 1851 that the new town was named Winston after Major Joseph Winston (1746-1815), a French and Indian War veteran, Surry County resident, state legislator and Revolutionary War leader. The development of Winston was fairly slow until 1873, when a twenty-eight-mile spur railroad connected Winston to Greensboro, beginning a fifty-year span of extensive growth. Salem and Winston consolidated in 1913 to form the town of Winston-Salem. Winston-Salem experienced tremendous growth and development in the early decades of the twentieth century, becoming the largest and richest city in North Carolina by 1926. Successes in tobacco, textiles and banking created great wealth, which was manifested in the construction of secular, religious, commercial and institutional buildings designed by nationally-recognized architects.<sup>2</sup>

Davidson County was created in 1822 from a portion of Rowan County and named in honor of General William Lee Davidson (1746-81), who was killed in the Revolutionary War Battle of Cowans Ford. Lexington, the county seat, was incorporated in 1827 and named for the April 19, 1775

Battle of Lexington, Massachusetts. A North Carolina Railroad line traversed the county by 1855, providing the impetus for commercial farming and the development of textile and furniture industries in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Thomasville, incorporated in 1857 and named for John Warwick Thomas (1800-1871), the town founder, is the second-largest city in Davidson County.<sup>3</sup>

Unpaved roads connected southeast Forsyth County to northeast Davidson County through the nineteenth century. The construction of the 1913 Winston-Salem Southbound Railway line between Winston-Salem and Lexington spurred development in that direction, but it wasn't until the 1920s that roads were significantly improved. By 1930, NC 109 extended north from Thomasville to NC 107/US 311 (Waughtown Road) near Winston-Salem following Old Thomasville Road, which connected Winston-Salem and Thomasville via Wallburg. Patterson Avenue served as the north/south corridor for US 52/NC 109 through Winston-Salem at that time.<sup>4</sup> The NC 109 alignment shifted slightly with improvements to the road between Winston-Salem and Thomasville in the 1950s, which served to encourage residential and commercial development along the corridor. New construction continues along NC 109 as farms are sold to make way for new subdivisions, but the area remains predominantly rural in character.

## ***Property Determined Not Eligible for the National Register***

### **Hine Farm (Property 137)**

#### Location

The Hine Farm is located at 3188 Gumtree Road in Davidson County. The house faces north toward Gumtree Road and is surrounded by a grass lawn ornamented with boxwoods and deciduous trees. A modern metal shed is southeast of the house and gravel driveway. A horse corral separates the house from a large frame barn to the west. A small garden is behind the barn.

#### Background Information

Harvey Henderson Hine built a brick bungalow for his family at the north end of his father's 152-acre farm in 1930. He constructed a large frame barn a few years later to house livestock including cows and horses. His daughter, Betty Snyder, vividly remembers milking the cows by hand as a small child. According to the 1935 North Carolina Farm Census report, H. H. Hine grew tobacco, hay, Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes and assorted truck crops on eight of the twenty acres he owned. The farm included an orchard with twenty-four fruit-bearing trees, one sow, one horse and seven milk cows. Harvey passed away in 1939 and his wife Vivian sold off some of the cows and began a poultry operation with fifty hens. The farm continued to produce corn, tobacco, oats and hay, but the number of fruit trees decreased to ten by 1945.<sup>18</sup>

Vivian raised four children in the house and managed the small farm. After her death in 1975, the property was subdivided and some of the acreage sold. Betty Snyder now owns the house and ten acres of land. Her sister lives next door, and the Stonegate development is south of their property.<sup>19</sup>

## Description

The Hine House is a one-story-on-basement, brick, front-gable-roofed bungalow with intersecting side-gabled bays. The house was executed in Flemish bond. A date stone on the west side of the front door reads "H. H. Hine 1930 A.D." Grouped windows with Craftsman-style sash flank the single-leaf entry, which is sheltered by a wrap-around porch with paired square posts on brick piers with concrete caps. A brick railing further defines the porch. Brick interior and end chimneys pierce the asphalt-shingle roof. A gabled porte-cochere extends from the west elevation. The weatherboards in the gable ends have been covered with vinyl siding. The porches on the southeast corner and east elevation of the house have been enclosed. A garage door was added to the rear elevation to provide access to the basement, and the lack of proper support for the opening has resulted in damage to the brickwork. The basement windows have been recently replaced.

A large frame barn with German siding, a concrete foundation and a metal roof stands west of the house. A small gabled addition extends from the east end of the north elevation, which includes seven square stall windows and a large double-leaf door. The east end of the barn is covered in metal siding. The south elevation has a large double-leaf door flanked by four square stall windows and an open equipment bay at the east end. The barn interior contains livestock stalls and a storage loft.

## Evaluation

The Hine Farm is not eligible for listing in the National Register under any criteria. According to North Carolina Farm Census reports, the size and level of production of the Hine Farm were not exceptional in any way, rendering it ineligible for the National Register under Criterion A for agriculture. No individuals associated with the Hine Farm attained the level of prominence and significance required for National Register listing under Criterion B.

The farm is not architecturally distinctive, making it ineligible for the National Register under Criterion C. The bungalow is a common example of one of the most popular styles of rural residences constructed during the early twentieth century and the barn is a typical 1930s frame outbuilding. Bungalows were inexpensive, easy to build and appealed to a families' desire to for a modern, up-to-date house. Rows of them extend along the sides of secondary roads and US highways in rural

Forsyth and Davidson Counties. Two brick bungalows nearly identical to the Hine House stand just a few miles away at 11525 and 11588 Old US 52 near its intersection with Gumtree Road.

The frame barn is almost as ubiquitous as the bungalow in the project area. Gable-roofed, frame barns similar to the barn on the Hine Farm can be found on the Motsinger Farm at 290 Motsinger Road SE and on the residual acreage associated with a farm at the junction of Wallburg and Union Cross Roads (Property 132, 4005 Wallburg Road). Gambrel-roofed, frame barns with vertical board siding are part of the outbuilding complexes at the Smith Farm (Property 124, 5972 Gumtree Road) and two small farms on Wallburg Road (Property 125, 4143-4147 Wallburg Road; Property 127, 4075 Wallburg Road). An exceptional example of a gambrel-roofed barn with German siding and two hip-roofed cupolas is located at 4949 Gumtree Road. Finally, the Hine Farm is unlikely to yield information about our past not otherwise accessible from other extant resources and written records, rendering it ineligible for the National Register under Criterion D.



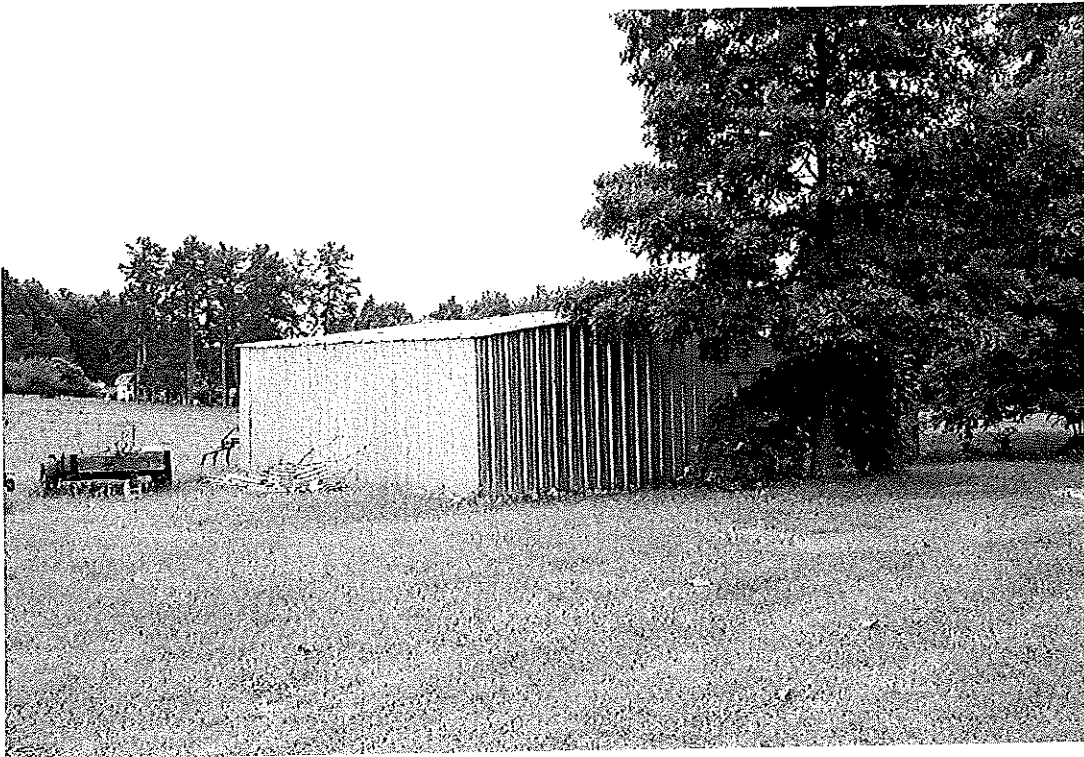

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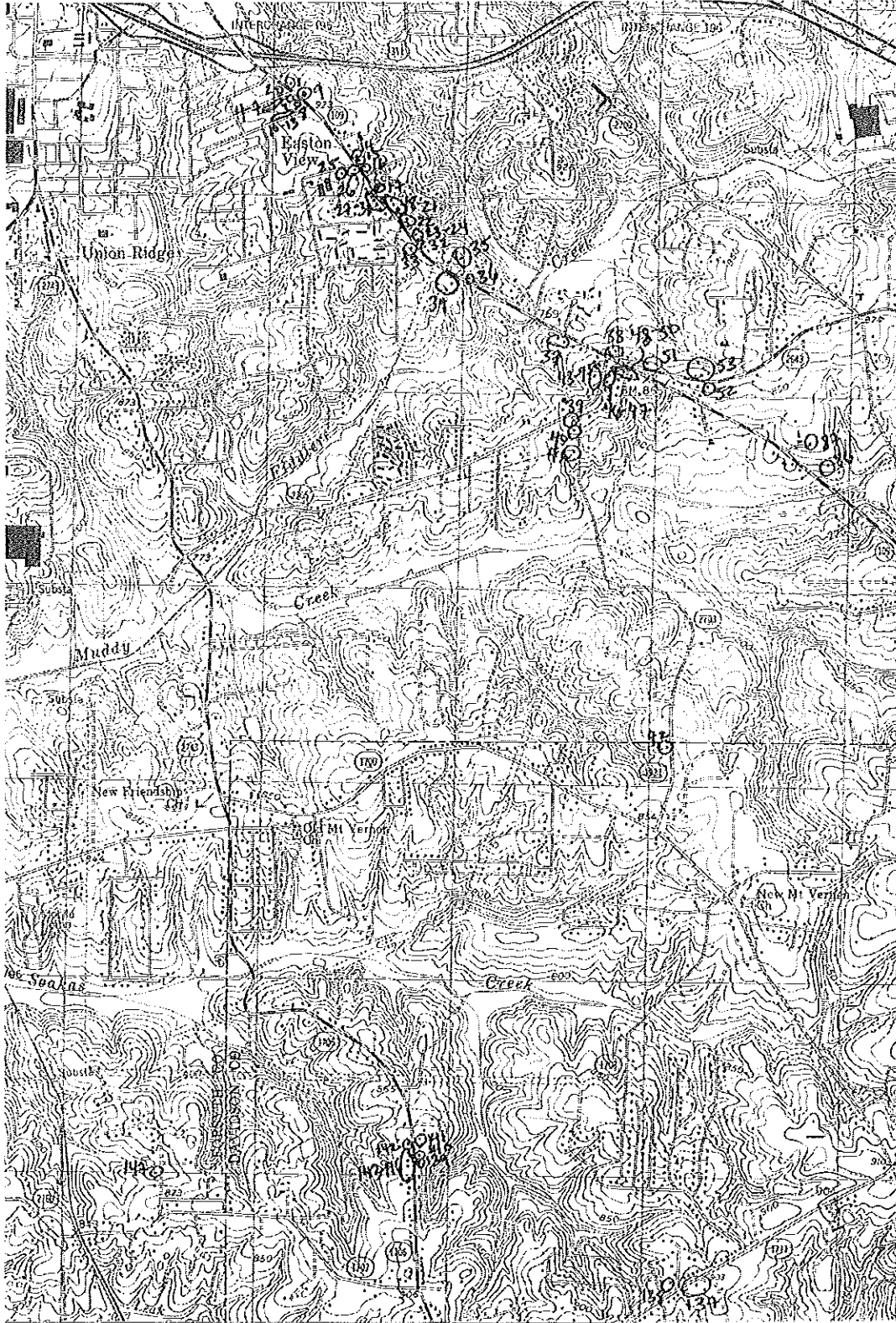
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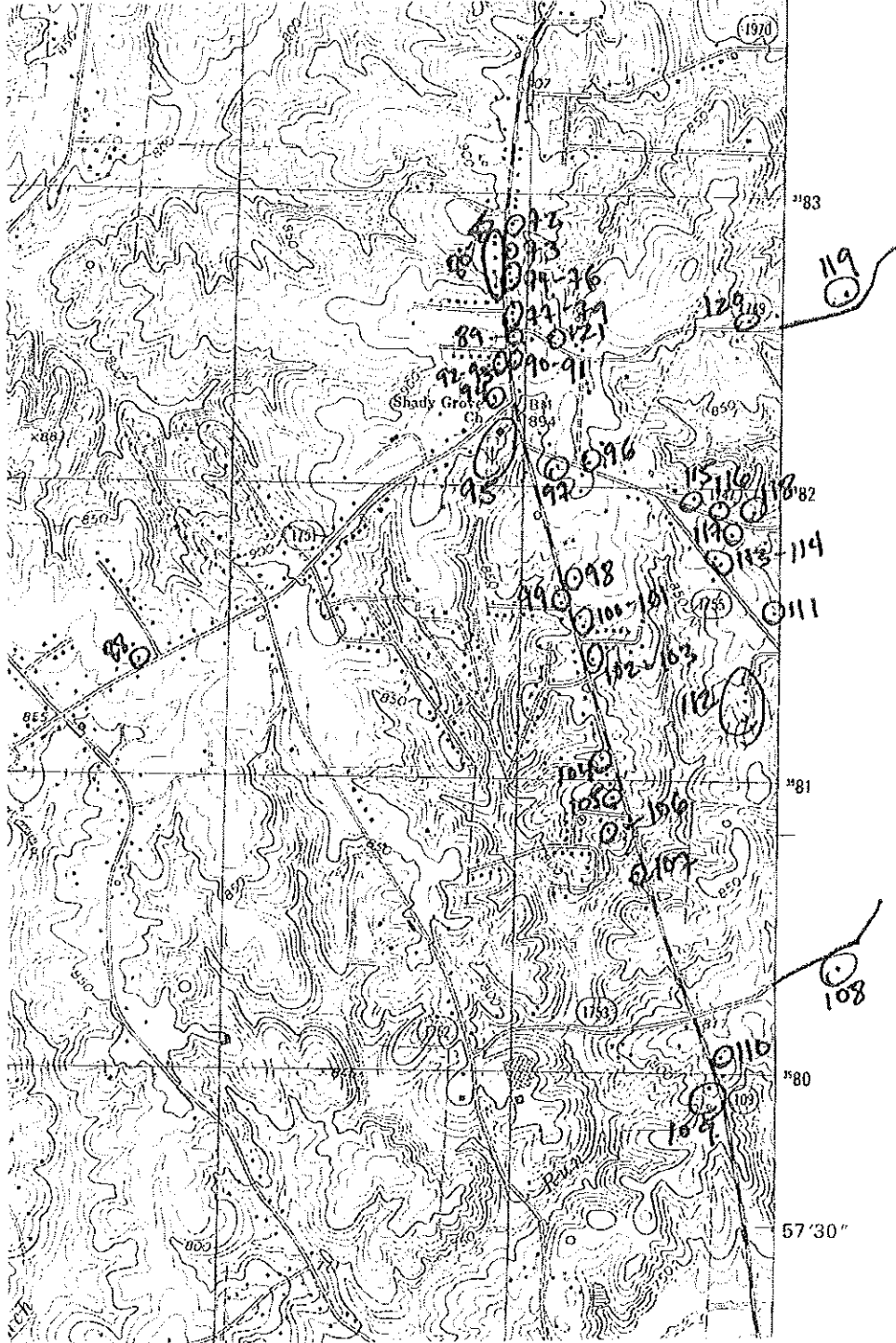

A flat-roofed metal carport is east of the house.

**14. Iglesia Adventista Church, circa 1950, 3501 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Forsyth County**

One-story-on-basement, concrete block, front-gable-roofed church with a double-leaf entry, metal casement windows, a gabled entry porch supported by square posts spanned by a wood railing, a brick foundation, asbestos siding in the gable ends, gable vents, and a small, hip-roofed bell tower.

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, replacement 1/1 sash, a full-width, gabled front porch supported by tapered posts on brick piers, and end chimney, a brick foundation, vinyl siding, triangular eave brackets and gable vents.

**42. House, circa 1940, 4370 Fox Meadow Lane, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry sheltered by a shed-roofed hood, 6/6 sash, a stuccoed brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents.

**43. House, 1935, 1263 Teague Road, Forsyth County**

One-and-one-half-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with two front-gabled bays, an arched single-leaf entry, replacement 1/1 sash, a brick end chimney and brick veneer.

One-and-one-half-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry with sidelights, 6/1 sash (paired on the façade), an entry porch supported by paired square posts on brick piers, a brick end chimney and brick veneer. Two modern frame sheds stand southwest of the house.

**45. House, 1950, 1241 Teague Road, Forsyth County**

One-and-one-half-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a front-gable bay, a recessed single-leaf entry, 6/6 sash, a brick interior chimney, brick veneer and a long, wood-shingled garage addition on the north elevation.

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, replacement 1/1 sash, a corner porch supported by truncated columns on brick piers spanned by a wood railing, a brick end chimney, brick veneer with vinyl German siding in the gables and gable vents. A long, side-gabled roofed, frame garage with vinyl German siding stands southwest of the house.

**47. House, 1935, 1260 Teague Road, Forsyth County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, replacement 1/1 sash, a shed-roofed entry porch supported by square posts, a gabled side entry porch supported by square posts, a stuccoed foundation and vinyl siding. One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, replacement 1/1 sash and picture windows, a gabled entry porch supported by replacement turned posts, a brick foundation, a red brick facade chimney with yellow brick diamonds, aluminum siding, gable vents and an attached screened porch and carport on the south elevation. A frame, front-gable-roofed single-bay garage stands southwest of the house.

**61. House, 1948, 4306 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Forsyth County**

One-and-one-half-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, replacement 1/1 sash, a gabled entry porch supported by metal posts spanned by a metal railing, a concrete block foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents.

**62. Commercial Building, circa 1930, east side Thomasville Road (NC 109) across from 4352-58, Forsyth County**

One-story, frame, stuccoed commercial building with a hip roof, a single-leaf entry, 6/1, 6/3 and plate glass windows, and a brick interior chimney. According to the proprietor of Ja Mae's Beauty Shop across the street, this building has served as a barber shop, sandwich shop, ice cream shop and dwelling and has been vacant for many years.

**63. Mickey's 109 Bar, circa 1940, east side Thomasville Road (NC 109) across from 4370, Forsyth County**

One-story, brick commercial building with a flat roof, a shed-roofed addition across the façade and a single-leaf entry. According to the proprietor of the music shop across the street, this building was originally a Crown Oil Gas Station.

**64. Commercial Building, circa 1970, 4352-54-56-58 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Forsyth County**

One-story, brick commercial building with a flat roof, single-leaf entries with transoms, plate glass windows and a shed-roofed porch supported by square, bracketed posts.

**65. Commercial Building, circa 1940, 4370 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Forsyth County**

One-story, concrete block, side-gable-roofed house turned commercial building with a single-leaf entry, 6/6 and 8/8 sash, a shed-roofed porch supported by square, bracketed posts, two brick interior chimneys, asbestos siding in the gable ends and gable vents.

**66. House, 1955, 4391 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Forsyth County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 2/2 horizontal and picture windows, a brick foundation, brick interior and end chimneys, German siding and gable vents. A modern metal carport stands south of the house.

**67. House, circa 1940, 10175 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a gabled entry bay, a recessed, single-leaf door sheltered by a metal awning, 6/6 sash, a gabled corner porch supported by metal posts, a brick foundation, a brick interior chimney, aluminum siding and gable vents. A modern frame shed and two frame garages stand west of the house.

**68. House, circa 1920, 10074 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

Two-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Colonial Revival with a two-story, flat-roofed portico supported by square posts, a single-leaf entry, 4/4 sash, a brick foundation, two brick interior chimneys, vinyl siding, gable vents, a one-story, shed-roofed addition on the south elevation and a series of rear additions. A modern frame shed and a frame garage stand east of the house.

**69. House, circa 1930, 9555 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story-and-one-half-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with a gabled entry bay, a single-leaf door, replacement 1/1 sash, a brick foundation, a tapered brick façade chimney, vinyl siding and a shed-roofed screened porch on the south elevation.

**70. House, circa 1920, 8930 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, 6/1 sash, a hip-roofed front porch supported by tapered posts on brick

piers spanned by a wood railing, a concrete block foundation, two brick chimneys, aluminum siding, gable vents and a series of rear additions. A front-gable-roofed frame shed with German siding and a rear addition stands east of the house.

**71. House, circa 1950, 8894 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry, 4/4, 6/6 and picture windows, a gabled entry porch supported by square posts, a concrete block foundation and vinyl siding.

**72. House, circa 1920, 6956 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, 4/1 sash, a hip-roofed front porch supported by square posts spanned by a wood lattice railing, a concrete block foundation, weatherboards and eave brackets. A side-gable-roofed frame shed with German siding stands east of the house.

**73. Barn/House, circa 1920, 6904 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-and-one-half-story, frame, gambrel-roofed barn converted into a residence with a single-leaf entry, a wide variety of window sash, a concrete block foundation, aluminum siding, gable vents and a concrete patio on the south elevation.

**74. House, circa 1940, 6866 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with single-leaf entries, replacement sash, gabled front and side porches supported by square posts, a brick foundation and vinyl siding. A front-gable-roofed frame shed with German siding and a rear addition stands east of the house.

**75. House, circa 1940, 6850 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled entry bay, a single-leaf entry flanked by narrow windows, metal casement windows, an enclosed porch with jalousie windows on the north elevation, an interior chimney and permastone and German siding. A metal garage with an open bay stands northeast of the house.

**76. House, circa 1940, 6830 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, flat-roofed, stuccoed Spanish Colonial Revival with a stepped parapet, a single-leaf entry flanked by narrow windows, metal casement windows, an arcaded entry porch with a stepped parapet and an interior chimney.

**77. House, circa 1950, 6776 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed house with a side-gabled wing on the north elevation, a single-leaf entry, 6/6 sash, a gabled entry porch supported by square posts, an interior chimney, a concrete block foundation and asbestos and vinyl siding. A front-gable-roofed frame shed stands southeast of the house.

**78. House, circa 1940, 6762 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, hip-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, replacement sash, a gabled entry porch supported by square posts, an interior chimney, a concrete block foundation, vinyl siding and a screened porch on the south elevation.

**79. First Fellowship Baptist Church, circa 1950, 6742 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, concrete block, front-gable-roofed commercial building turned church with a shed addition on the north elevation, a single-leaf entry, plate glass windows, an entry porch supported by metal poles and a shed-roofed addition on the north elevation. A one-story, side-gable-roofed, concrete block building with two single-leaf entries, 2/2 horizontal sash and German siding in the gables is directly behind the church.

**80. House, circa 1950, 6801 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry sheltered by a narrow shed-roofed hood, 1/1 replacement sash, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, aluminum siding and gable vents.

**81. House, circa 1950, 6819 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry sheltered by a narrow shed-roofed hood, 2/2 horizontal and picture

windows, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, aluminum siding, gable vents, and a gabled addition and metal carport on the south elevation.

**82. House, circa 1950, 6847 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 replacement sash, a brick façade chimney, a brick foundation, vinyl siding, gable vents and a screened porch on the north elevation.

**83. House, circa 1920, 6883 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 sash, a hip-roofed front porch supported by square posts, a brick chimney, a brick foundation, German siding and eave brackets.

**84. House, circa 1940, 6915 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 sash, a side-gable roofed front porch supported by square posts spanned by a wood railing, two brick interior chimneys, a brick foundation, vinyl German siding, gable vents and an attached one-bay garage on the south elevation.

**85. House, circa 1940, 6929 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 sash, a shed-roofed front porch supported by square posts, a brick interior chimney, a brick foundation, asbestos siding and a rear addition. A front-gable-roofed, single-bay, frame garage and a frame shed stand west of the house.

**86. Gray Swain House, 1952, 4175 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Forsyth County**

Two-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Colonial Revival with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 sash, a gabled entry porch supported by square posts, a brick interior chimney, brick veneer and vinyl siding, wall dormers and a shed-roofed porch on the south end of the façade, gable vents and an attached two-bay garage.

**87. House, 1946, 4171 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Forsyth County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 6/6 sash, a partially enclosed porch supported by square posts, a brick end

chimney, a brick foundation and metal siding, linked by an open breezeway to a one-story log building moved from the eastern side of the property. The log building has concrete chinking, a brick foundation, vertical board siding in the gables, single-leaf entries and 6/6 sash. An almost identical, also moved log building stands southeast of the house and has a two-bay frame garage attached to its east elevation. A hip-roofed wellhouse with metal siding stands south of the log buildings.

**88. House, circa 1950, 1070 Shady Grove Church Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gable bay, a single-leaf entry, 6/6 and picture windows, a shed-roofed entry porch supported by metal posts, a brick interior chimney, brick veneer, gable vents and a shed-roofed addition with wood shake siding on the east elevation. A front-gable-roofed, single-bay garage with vinyl siding stands northeast of the house. A shed-roofed, frame garage with rolled asphalt siding and a metal-sheathed tobacco barn stand further north.

**89. House, circa 1950, 6724 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry sheltered by a metal awning supported by metal posts, 2/2 horizontal and picture windows, an interior chimney, brick veneer and aluminum siding and gable vents. A front-gable-roofed, concrete block garage with German siding in the gables stands southeast of the house.

**90. House, circa 1940, 6688 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with a front-gabled entry bay, a single-leaf entry sheltered by a canvas awning, 1/1 and picture windows, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents. A front-gable-roofed, frame shed with vinyl siding and a double-leaf entry stands southeast of the house.

**91. House, circa 1950, 6674 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry, 2/2 horizontal and narrow plate glass windows, a concrete block end chimney, a concrete block foundation, vinyl German siding, a small addition on the façade and a large addition on the south elevation.



**92. House, circa 1950, 6665 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, hip-roofed house with a single-leaf entry sheltered by a metal awning, 1/1 and picture windows, an interior chimney, a brick foundation and aluminum siding. Two metal sheds stand northwest of the house.

**93. House, circa 1950, 6681 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, horizontally-sliding sash, a brick foundation, aluminum siding and a screened porch on the north elevation. A series of frame sheds stand southwest of the house.

**94. Rental House, Shady Grove United Methodist Church, House, circa 1940, 167 Shady Grove Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 6/1 sash, a shed-roofed entry porch supported by grouped square posts spanned by a wood railing, an interior chimney, a concrete block foundation, asbestos siding and a gabled wing on the south elevation.

**95. Shady Grove United Methodist Church, 1955-56, 167 Shady Grove Road, Davidson County**

Two-story-on-basement, brick, T-plan Colonial Revival church with round-arch, stained-glass windows framed by brick buttresses. A new, oak, double-leaf door is surmounted by the original stained-glass transom at the base of the centrally-located bell tower on the façade. Metal casement windows illuminate the basement and the rear education wing. A gabled brick hyphen connects the sanctuary to a one-story, brick, hexagonal office wing. Another gabled brick hyphen connects the office wing to the new, two-story, brick education wing on the southeast side of the complex. The cemetery, surrounded by a new black aluminum fence with brick gateposts, is located southeast of the church and a paved parking lot.

The original Shady Grove Methodist Episcopal Church was a log building constructed in 1835 on 1.75 acres purchased from Ruben and Sofie Mason. In 1889, the log structure was sold and moved for use as a farm storage building and a new frame church was erected just west of the site of the old church. William and Louisa A. Collett donated additional acreage for a church cemetery in 1890, and Daniel Weavil was the first person interred there. The frame church was renovated in the late 1920s/early 1930s, but

the congregation soon required additional space. R. P. Kennedy started a building fund for a new sanctuary in the late 1940s, and construction began in 1955. The first service in the new building was held on March 19, 1956. The name changed to Shady Grove United Methodist Church in 1968.<sup>1</sup> Recent additions to the complex include an office wing and education building.

**96. House, circa 1920, 248 Clodfelter Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 6/6 sash, a gabled entry porch supported by square posts, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents. A large metal shed and carport stand northeast of the house.

**97. House, circa 1920, 194 Clodfelter Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, pyramidal-hip-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 sash, a hip-roofed entry porch supported by metal posts, a concrete block foundation, aluminum siding and a shed-roofed rear porch. A front-gable-roofed, frame garage with German siding stands southeast of the house.

**98. House, circa 1950, 6180 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry sheltered by a metal awning, 1/1 and picture windows, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents. A modern, frame, gambrel-roofed shed stands northeast of the house.

**99. House, circa 1950, 6139 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry, 1/1 replacement sash, a shed-roofed entry porch supported by a square post, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents. A large, front-gable-roofed, concrete block, two-bay garage with metal casement windows stands north of the house.

**100. House, circa 1950, 6094 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, hip-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 6/6 and picture windows, an interior chimney, brick veneer and an attached carport with brick posts and vinyl siding in the gable ends.

**101. House, circa 1950, 6012 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 sash, an interior chimney, a concrete block foundation, vinyl siding and an attached carport with square posts and a rear shed room. Several frame and metal sheds stand east of the house.

**102. House, circa 1950, 6022 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 and picture windows, an interior chimney, a concrete block foundation, vinyl siding and an attached carport with square posts and a rear shed room. Several frame sheds and a metal carport stand south and east of the house.

**103. House, circa 1950, 6044 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 and picture windows, front and side gabled porches supported by square posts, an interior chimney, a concrete block foundation and asbestos siding.

**104. House, circa 1940, just north of 5761 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story-and-one-half-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with a gabled entry bay, a single-leaf door, 6/6 and 8/8 sash, a brick end chimney and brick veneer.

**105. House, circa 1950, 5761 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 replacement sash, a gabled entry porch supported by metal posts spanned by a metal railing, an enclosed corner porch, two gabled dormers, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, vinyl siding, wood paneling and gable vents.

**106. House, circa 1940, 131 Reese Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry, 1/1, picture and bay windows, a shed-roofed entry porch supported by square posts, a brick end chimney, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents.

**107. House, circa 1940, 5561 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with a gabled entry bay, a single-leaf entry, 1/1 replacement sash, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents.

**108. Green Farm (DV-101), 1920, 758 Jesse Green Road, Davidson County**

Two-story, frame I-house with a single-leaf entry, 2/2 horizontal replacement sash, a hip-roofed front porch supported by tapered wood posts, a brick chimney, a brick foundation, asbestos siding and gable vents. A frame, three-bay equipment shed stands southwest of the house.

**109. House, circa 1900, west side Thomasville Road (NC 109) approximately 750 feet south of its intersection with Jesse Green Road (SR 1753), Davidson County**

Two-story, frame I-house with a single-leaf entry, original 2/2 sash, a hip-roofed front porch supported by square posts on brick piers, two brick single-shouldered end chimneys with corbelled stacks, a brick foundation, asbestos siding and a series of rear additions. A large, partially-collapsed frame shed stands west of the house. Two frame barns, a frame equipment shed and a frame storage shed are south of the house.

**110. House, circa 1940, 5116 Thomasville Road (NC 109), Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage/Minimal Traditional with two front gables, a single-leaf entry, 1/1 replacement sash, a side porch supported by square posts, a brick façade chimney with stone accents, a brick foundation, vinyl German siding, gable vents and a large addition on the south elevation.

**111. House, 1928, 743 Johnson Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry, 6/1 sash, an engaged front porch supported by tapered columns, a brick end chimney, brick veneer and gable vents.

**112. Elmer Proctor Farm, circa 1940, 830 Proctor Farm Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, 3/1 and 1/1 sash, an enclosed front porch, an interior chimney, a stuccoed brick foundation, weatherboards and German siding, exposed rafter ends, eave brackets, gable vents and a rear addition. A frame garage and carport are north of the house. A circa 1950, frame hip-roofed dwelling with single-leaf entries, 1/1 sash, a concrete block interior chimney, a concrete block foundation and asbestos siding is south of the original house. Four frame tobacco barns, two with board-and-batten siding and two sheathed with metal siding, are southeast of the house. A large frame shed and two metal sheds are west of the tobacco barns. According to Joyce Cecil, Elmer Proctor's daughter, her father purchased the frame house around 1940 and built all of the barns over the next twenty years.

**113. House, 1951, 609 Johnson Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry sheltered by a metal awning, 1/1 and picture windows, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, aluminum siding and an attached garage on the north elevation.

**114. House, circa 1920, 587 Johnson Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, cross-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, 4/1 sash, a gabled front porch supported by tapered posts on brick piers, brick end and interior chimneys, a concrete block foundation and aluminum siding. A modern frame shed with a double-leaf entry stands east of the house. According to the owner of 609 Johnson Road, the house was moved to this location in 1975.

**115. House, circa 1940, 231 Clodfelter Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with a front-gabled bay, an arched entry, 1/1 replacement sash, an arcaded side porch, an interior chimney and brick veneer. A frame shed and a frame garage are located behind the house.

**116. House, circa 1940, north side Clodfelter Road between 231 and 485, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Period Cottage with a front-gabled entry bay, an arched entry, 1/1 replacement sash, an arcaded side porch, two interior chimneys, brick veneer and a screened porch on the east elevation. A frame shed and a frame garage are located southeast of the house.

**117. House, circa 1920, 370 Clodfelter Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 sash, an engaged front porch supported by square posts on spanned by a wood railing, a shed dormer, two interior chimneys, a rusticated concrete block foundation and vinyl German siding. A front-gable-roofed, frame garage with vinyl German siding, a double-leaf entry and exposed rafter ends and a metal shed are located southeast of the house.

**118. House, circa 1950, 485 Clodfelter Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed Minimal Traditional with a front-gabled bay, a single-leaf entry, 6/6 sash, an engaged front porch supported by turned posts, an interior chimney, a brick foundation, aluminum siding, gable vents and a rear addition. Four frame sheds and a front-gable-roofed, two-bay, frame garage with German siding and a rear addition are located east, west and south of the house.

**119. House, 1930, 781 Stoney Ridge Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 6/6 sash, a gabled front porch supported by square posts, a brick foundation, asbestos siding, gable vents, a screened porch on the north elevation and a rear addition. A long carport stands north of the house.

**120. House, 1942, 643 Stoney Ridge Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, front-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, replacement windows, a hip-roofed front porch supported by square posts spanned by a wood railing, a stuccoed foundation, metal "board-and-batten" siding and a large addition at the northwest corner. Three frame and log outbuildings stand north of the house.

**121. House, 1900, 189 Stoney Ridge Road, Davidson County**

Two-story, frame, I-house with a single-leaf entry, 2/2 horizontal replacement sash, a screened front porch supported by turned posts, a brick foundation, vinyl siding, gable vents and a series of side and rear additions. A frame shed stands north of the house, and a new one-and-one-half-story, front-gable-roofed garage with vinyl siding is east of the house.

**122. House, circa 1950, 541 Wallburg-High Point Road, Davidson County**

One-story, frame, side-gable-roofed house with a single-leaf entry, 6/6 sash, a flat-roofed front porch supported by square posts, brick façade and interior chimneys, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and gable vents. A three-rail vinyl fence separates the house and lawn from a pasture and five frame and metal barns. Additional barns, sheds and fields are located across the road.

**124. Smith Farm, 1927, 5972 Gumtree Road, Forsyth County**

One-story, frame, cross-gable-roofed bungalow with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 replacement sash, a hip-roofed front porch supported by tapered posts on brick piers spanned by a wood railing, two interior chimneys, a brick foundation, vinyl siding, gable vents and an addition on the west elevation with a concrete block foundation and German siding. A large, two-story, front-gable-roofed, concrete block garage with asbestos siding in the gables, a standing-seam metal roof and a frame shed addition on the rear elevation is located southwest of the house. A side-gable-roofed, frame garage with asphalt-shingle siding and a standing-seam metal roof is located south of the house. A gambrel-roofed, frame barn with vertical board siding is south of the other outbuildings.

**125. House, Barn and Garage, 1920, 4143 and 4147 Wallburg Road, Forsyth County**

Two-story, frame, I-house with a single-leaf entry, 1/1 replacement sash, a shed-roofed front porch supported by square posts, two brick end chimneys, a brick foundation, vinyl siding and a new 5V-crimp metal roof. An original ell with a new addition and porch on its western side extends from the rear elevation.
